#### **Rent Waiver Moratorium Extended**

The President has issued an extension of the **federal eviction moratorium th**rough June 30, 2021. We need residents to please keep in mind that this does not excuse tenants from paying rent, it only provides additional time for those whose income has been affected the opportunity to pay later. We encourage our tenants that can pay to do so as the funds become available so you can avoid a large sum of rent being due at one time after the moratorium ends.

There is rental assistance available for tenants facing financial hardships and past due rent.

The Pfizer vaccine is recommended for people aged 16 years and older.Number of shots: 2 shots, 21 days apart.How given: Shot in the muscle of the upper arm.

The Moderna vaccine is recommended for people aged 18 years and older.Number of shots: 2 shots, one month (28 days) apart.How given: Shot in the muscle of the upper arm.

## Resident Spotlight



**Chandra Johnson** moved into one of the Columbus Housing Authority apartments in November 2019 with a plan in place. One year later, November 2020, she moved out of public housing. Grateful for the opportunity to have a place to stay for her and her son, Asa, when things were not so good, Chandra knew her stay would not be long. During her time with Columbus Housing Authority, Chandra set goals and took steps to achieve them. Chandra says, "I was determined to create a better life for my son and I. I graduated college and started my dream career to show my son and others around me that anything is possible if you work hard and be diligent in your efforts."

Work hard and diligent in her efforts were exactly what Chandra did. She enrolled in the ROSS (Resident Opportunity Self- Sufficiency) Program. The Friendly City Resident Council ROSS Program is a voluntary program for public housing residents with supportive services, resident empowerment activities, and assistance in becoming economically self-sufficient. These services enable participating families to increase earned income, reduce or eliminate the need for welfare assistance, make progress toward achieving economic independence and housing self-sufficiency. Chandra's participation in the program stemmed from her job ending, and she did not want to relocate to another state. Her goals were to get another job, complete her degree, and move out of housing. And she completed all three within a year. She most certainly was diligent in her efforts! Whenever referrals were sent, Chandra followed through. At one time, she was working two jobs. Now, she is working only one job. She earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Biology and Business Administration. In addition, she earned a certification in teaching securing her a position with CMSD to teach this upcoming school year. With perseverance, determination and taking advantage of various resources, Chandra's dream career has begun. Her next step is to continue her education this fall by pursuing a master's degree in Continuing Education from Mississippi State University.

When she is not working, you may find Chandra helping others. She believes in giving back. Chandra volunteers with an after-school program and at her church helping others in need. During her free time or "Me Time" she likes to travel and learn more about the world.



In October 2020, Columbus Housing Authority was selected to participate in the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development's HUD ConnectHome Initiative to close the digital divide in America and to extend affordable broadband access to families living in HUD-assisted housing. Through ConnectHome, internet service providers and nonprofits are able to offer broadband access, technical training, digital literacy programs and devices for residents in assisted housing units.

To address challenges residents are facing with their children and virtual learning, job seeking, applying for school or employment, training, virtual workshops, online classes, telehealth, and document submission, Columbus Housing Authority partnered with T-Mobile and acquired 50 mobile devices and 50 hotspots for resident use. The T-Mobile program connects school-aged children's households with free hotspots, and discounted devices.

Devices available include free tablets. The costs for devices were waived by T-Mobile. The actual cost to the housing authority is for monthly data usage on the devices, hotspots and protective cases.





Usage of the devices will be incorporated into the Columbus Housing Authority's Friendly City ROSS Program and made available to be used by residents who lack mobile devices or internet services in their homes. The devices can be checked out from the resource center on an as needed basis by the head of household and returned in the same manner for accountability. This type of partnership is important because it removes many of the barriers that Public Housing Residents and low- income families face.
